


Monthly Garden Tip for September

- September with its warm days and cool nights is the ideal month for establishing reseeding, rejuvenating and fertilizing the lawn. Six or seven weeks of vigorous growth in the fall builds root systems, stores energy in the roots and helps grass to overwinter and get off to a better start in the spring.
- Much of Virginia is a transition zone where both cool and warm season grasses grow. In the northern Piedmont, cool season grasses such as Kentucky bluegrass, tall fescue, fine fescue and turf type perennial grass should be planted. Tall fescues make a tough lawn tolerate heat and the most extensively used grasses for lawns in this area. Use red fescue seed for shady areas.
- Plant peonies in holes that were prepared last month. Plant root divisions so "eye" is 1-1/2 in. below surface of soil. Firm soil around root division and water well. If properly planted, peonies need not be disturbed for years. They do not do well surrounded by ground cover or tree roots.
- Plant spring-blooming shrubs, ground covers and new perennials.

When access to food in NOT consistent and dependable, a household is classified as food insecure. The U.S.

Department of Agriculture released this report in May 2013. The authors analyzed the two most recent years of survey research on the topic of food insecurity in households with children. They found:



21% of households with children were food insecure at some point in 2011...that's nearly double the level of food insecurity of homes without children (12%).

Food security is especially important for children because their nutrition affects not only their current health, but also their physical, mental, and social development.

While food insecurity is less prevalent in Virginia than most states, one in 16 homes with children were classified as food insecure.

A MASONIC INCIDENT

THE CRAFTSMAN - 1866

A little incident, containing some mystical interest, transpired in Wayne county, South Carolina, during the late war. It is as follows:-

It was late at night, the husband was absent, and the wife, alone with her children, had retired. Three or four soldiers rudely knocked at the door of the house, and demanded entrance and something to eat. The good lady told them that it was too late, that she had nothing cooked, but fearing they would break the door, she got out of bed, and opened it to expostulate with them.

They insisted that she should cook something for them, and while she was getting ready, and they were roaming about the house, one of the party, who seemed to be the leader, happened to find a copy of Mackey's "Masonic Jurisprudence." Turning over he found the name of the poor, frightened woman's husband written on the fly-leaf.

"Is this your husband's?" he inquired of the lady. "Yes sir," was the timid reply.

"Is he a Mason?"

"Yes Sir."

"Come, boys, right about-march!" and immediately the house was cleared and quickly closed.

<u>Vogurt Muffins</u> (Makes 12 muffins)

cup yogurt
teaspoon baking soda
cup butter
eggs
tsp pure vanilla
cups flour
tsp baking powder
tsp salt
cup sugar
cup of chocolate chips (optional)

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350°. Grease muffin tin or line with papers. Mix yogurt and baking soda, set aside. In another bowl, beat butter, add eggs one at a time, then vanilla. Add dry ingredients, gently folding yogurt mix at end. Bake approximately 20-25 minutes until golden brown. (Freezes well or good for packed lunches.)

SEEK AND YE SHALL FIND

The making of a Freemason consists of a continuing course of education, of training, and of character forming. While it may be accepted that it is an innermost desire, followed by obligations that makes one a member of the Craft, yet in a truer form and better sense, a man is naver a Freemason until he truthfully and loyally lives up to his obligations. A member of the Craft who merely takes his degrees in a listless, careless sort of manner, and then remains as just a spectator at Lodge meetings, may hold to the opinion that Freemasonry differs little from other societies. The contrary, the Master Mason who delves deeply into Masonic literature takes a lively interest in every part of the Ritualistic and Lodge Work, and learns the origin, meaning and moral bearing of its symbols, cannot possibly fall into such an error. To him Freemasonry has a refining and elevating influence not to be found in the ordinary run of organizations.

The philosophies of Freemasonry, when discovered and then accepted and practiced, provide that simple but profound solution to the problems of human relationships. May it be accepted that Freemasonry is a way of living to the Master Mason who is interested enough to appraise and value the wealth that is his, and his alone, by virtue of his Masonic Membership.

The best informed Master Mason is the Master Mason who reads and studies. Consequently, if we want Freemasonry to be of practical usefulness and cultural attainment, we, as Freemasons, must not neglect our Masonic reading, our Masonic studying and our research for more Masonic Light.
